Learning targets

- To take part in local democracy by contacting their 'prospective MP'
- To use persuasive letter writing skills to make a positive difference to Climate Change

Steps

1. Making a difference
2. Handwriting your letter
3. Sending your letter



Step 1: Making a difference

For example, in their schools, families or communities.

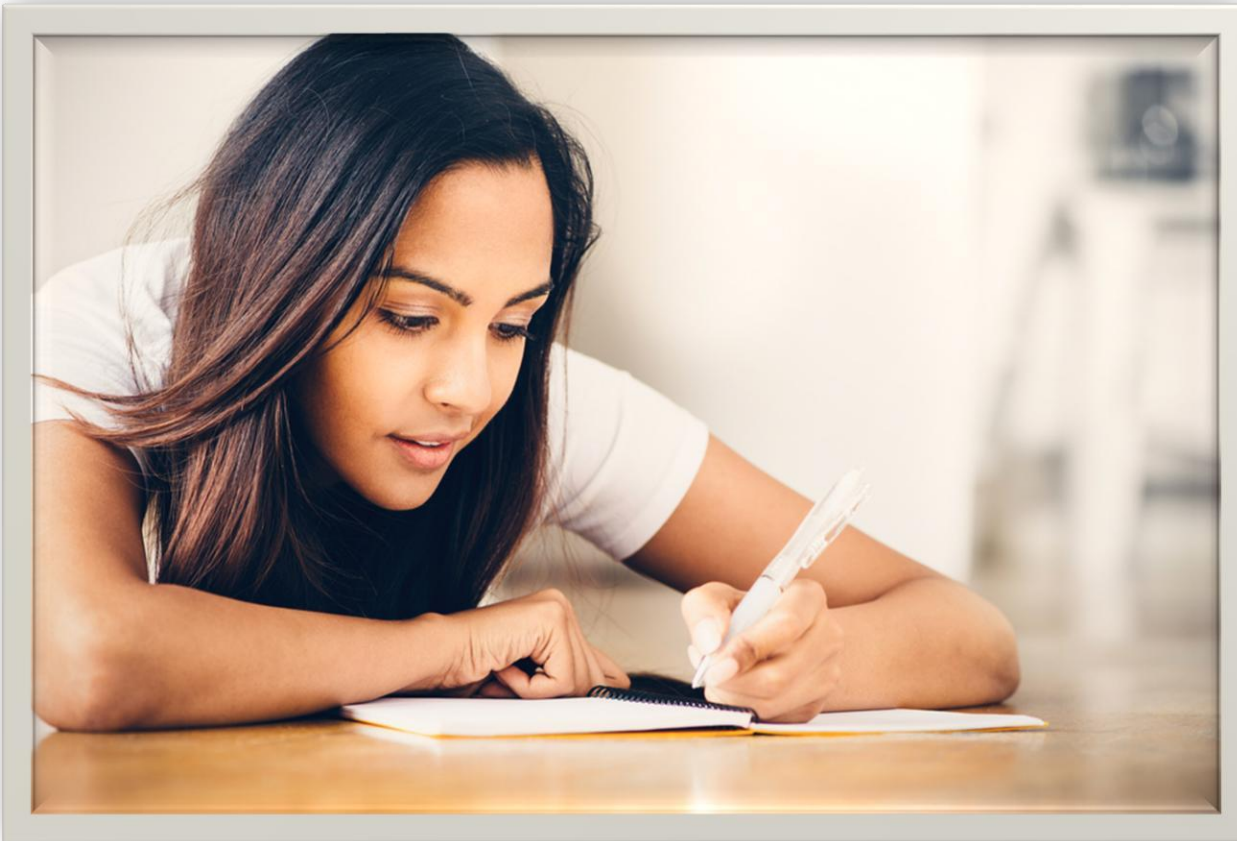
Discuss which are the easiest and which are the most difficult to achieve and why.

Can you describe the difference between tactics such as protesting, civil disobedience, lobbying and voting for change.

Step 2: Handwriting a letter to your local MP



In this activity you are going to hand write a letter to your local MP (Member of Parliament).



Handwriting Letter writing tips:

- Do a rough draft first
- Choose your pen (this can be a normal biro or maybe a special gel pen, ink pen or even a quill!!)
- Tell the MP who you are (name, school etc as appropriate).
- Tell the MP why you are writing and how they can help – we have included a sample letter on the next slide which you can use to get you started
- Sign your letter
- Give the letter to your teacher
- Your teacher will take a photo of your letter and email it to your local MP and secretariat@globelegislators.org

The 8th edition of [London Climate Action Week](http://www.londonschoolsclimateaction.org) is between 20 June to 28 June 2026. This year all London schools are invited to take part in London Climate Action Week (LCAW) activities schools-based activities taking place from 22 June to 26 June. The LCAW approach to schools engagement is framed by five major themes – the four ‘C’s and the one ‘F’ – **Campus, Curriculum, Community, Careers and Finance**.
